


African Americans in Warwick
STATISTICS FROM THE CENSUS UP TO 1830

This table is intended to give a general idea of the numbers of African Americans living in Warwick during this period.. The terms used by the census changed over time, and did not differentiate between “non white” races. Some may have been Native Americans, in some of the censuses (see notes below.) The determination of “white” or “colored” is also the result of contemporary practice, which by custom determined the race of the individual by his or her mother’s race. In any event it can be seen that the percentage of blacks in Warwick during this time period is a small, but significant, proportion of the population.
