OFFICIAL RETURN Of the late Congressional Election in this county.

Majority, 490 for Borland. Whole number of votes taken, 2371. Last spring the whole number of Congressional votes was 3316.

Convicts.—At the late court of Oyer and Terminer, for this county—Isiah Schoonover, was convicted of wire-breaking, and was sentenced to the state prison for life.

Stephen Bailey, was convicted of forgery, and sentenced to the state prison for eight years.

John Dilly, was convicted of sheep stealing, and was sentenced to the state prison for five years. He stole a flock of sheep on Monday last, was apprehended on Tuesday, indicted on Wednesday, arraigned and plead guilty on Thursday, and was sentenced on Friday.

Ernestor Hard, was convicted of assault & battery with intent to commit a rape. The judge considered this a case where his discretionary power might be properly exercised—He was sentenced to three months imprisonment in the county jail.

No sooner said than done.—It will be seen by the proceedings below, that the hints which were thrown out by a writer in our paper of last week, have not been lost. The subject has met a prompt and spirited attention, not only from the citizens of Gosheen, but the whole county claims a share in the laudable and patriotic undertaking. A committee of arrangements has been appointed—the six first named were in the battle, and we recognize among them many of the descendants of those who perished. A committee is also appointed to solicit donations, to enable the other committee to carry into effect the objects for which it was appointed. Subscriptions are already in the hands of the several town committees: And who is there among us, that will not be proud to have his name enrolled with the list of donors, to rescue from oblivion, the memory of the men who fearlessly breasted the tomahawk and the scalping knife, and sacrificed their valuable lives, to rescue the county of Orange from the unstrained cruelty and violence of savage depredations—and let it be borne in mind, that the bones of these men still lie bleaching upon the banks of the Delaware. A heavy debt of gratitude is due to their memory; and the size and embellishments of the monument to be erected, will depend alone on the liberality of our citizens.

At a meeting of a number of respectable inhabitants of the county of Orange, held at the house of JESSE LISSELL, in Gosheen, on Wednesday, the 14th day of Nov. 1821—for the purpose of taking into consideration, the propriety and expediency of collecting and interring the BONES of those who fell in the battle at Minisink, on the 22d of July, 1779—

Resolved, that it is proper and expedient to collect and inter the bones above mentioned, and erect a suitable monument to their memory.

Resolved, that a committee be appointed to collect the bones, who shall be a standing committee of arrangements for their interment, and procuring and erecting a suitable monument to their memory—and that said committee consist of the following persons, viz. Resolved, that the above named committee, be requested to meet at the Court-House in Gosheen, on the 22d day of November, inst. at 11 o'clock, A. M. for the purpose of making proper arrangements to carry into effect the intentions of this meeting.

Resolved, that the bones be interred in the Old Burying Ground of the Presbyterian Church in Gosheen.

Resolved, that a committee of five persons from each town be appointed to solicit and receive donations, under the direction of the Committee of Arrangements, for the purpose of interring the bones and erecting a monument.

New Constitution.—We this day publish the whole of the Constitution adopted by the late Convention. That part of it which is on the first page, was printed off before a corrected copy was received, but we have noted all the corrections, to the only material one being that which relates to the pay of members of the legislature—by the last amendment, they can in no case receive more than three dollars a day.

The election for the adoption or rejection of this constitution, is to be held on the third Tuesday in January next, and the two succeeding days. Every person who voted for delegates to the convention, will be entitled to vote for or against the new constitution. Those who are in favor of it are to have the word "Yes," on their ballots, and those who are against it the word "No."

The following is the address which accompanied the constitution. ALBANY, NOV. 10, 1821. To the People of the State of New-York.

The delegates of the people, in Convention, having this day terminated their deliberations, present to you the constitution of the state in an amended form, as the result of the arduous and responsible duties which your confidence has imposed upon them. They have adopted this course from a sense of the great dif-

ulty, if not impracticability of a submitting to the people, for its ratification, in separate articles, the various amendments which have been adopted by majorities of the convention. This difficulty is very much increased, by the reflection, that the adoption of some articles, and the rejection of others, might greatly impair the symmetry of the whole. The convenience of having the amendments incorporated with those parts of the constitution which are to remain unaltered, will readily be perceived. We therefore, submit to the people, the choice between the old, and amended constitution.

That difference of opinion should exist among individuals, on the various topics which have passed in review before us, will not excite surprise. Various local interests, and diversity of political sentiment, among a free people, will of necessity, lead to different opinions. Probably, the amended constitution, now submitted, is not, in all its provisions, in exact accordance with the desires of any individual member of the convention; but in the spirit of mutual concession and compromise, we have come to a result, which we hope the people, actuated by the same spirit, will approve and ratify. We therefore, submit to your investigation, reflection, and final decision, with the most respectful deference; & do most devoutly implore the supreme ruler of the universe, that he will perpetuate the blessings of rational liberty, and endue us plentifully with that wisdom from above, which is profitable to direct in all things.
