Majority, 480 for Borland. Whole number of votes taken, 2374. Last spring the whole number of Congressional votes was 3516.

Convicts .- At the late court of O. yer and Terminer, for this county-Isalah Schoonover, was convicted of store-breaking, and was sentenced to the state prison for life.

Stephen Builey, was convicted of forgery, and sentenced to the state prison for eight years.

John Delly, was convicted of sheap stealing, and was sentenced to the state prison for five years - He stole a flock of sheep on Monday last, was apprehended on Tuesday, indicted on Wednesday, arraigned and plead gnilty on Thursday, and was sentene d'on Friday.

Elmezer Heard, was convicted of assault & hattery with intent to com-nat a rape. The judge considered this a case where his discretionary power might be properly exercised— He was sentenced to three monts inprisonment in the county jail.

No sooner said than done .- It will he seen by the proceedings below, that the hads which were thrown out by a writer in our paper of last week, have not been lost. The subject has met a prompt and spirited attention, not only from the civizens of Goshen, but the while county claims a share in the landable and patriotic undertaking. A committee of arran ements been appointed—the six first named were in the battle, and we recognize among them many of the descendants of those who perished. A committee is also appointed to solicit donations, to enable the other committee to carry into effect the objects for which it was appointed. Subscriptions are already in the hands of the several town committees : And who is there among us, that will not be proud to have his name corolled with the lest of donors, to resent from the livion, the memory of the men who fearlessly breasted the tomahawk as d the scalping knife, and sacrificed their valuable lives, to rescue the county of Orange from the unrestrained cruelty and violence of savage depredations-and let it be borne in mind, that the bones of these men still he bleaching upon the banks of the Delaware. A heavy debt of gratitade is due to their memory; and the size and embellishments of the monument to be creeted, will depend alone on the liberality of our citizens.

New Constitution .- We this day publish the whole of the Constitution adopted by the late Convention. That part of it which is on the first page, was printed off before a corrected copy was recoived, but we have noted all the corrections, the only material one being that which relates to the pay or members of the legislatureby the last amendment, they can in no case receive more than three dollars a day.

The election for the adoption or re jection of this constitution, is to be held on the third Tuesday in January next, and the two succeeding days. Every person who voted for delegates convention, will be entitled to vote for or against the new constitution. Thuse who are in favor of it are to have the word " Ies," on their ballots, and those who are against it the word " No."

The following is the address which companied the constitution. accompanied th

ALBANY, Nov. 10, 1921. To the People of the State of New-

The delegates of the people, in Convention, having this day terminated their deliberations, present to you the constitution of the state in an awended form, as the result of arduous and responsible duties which your confidence has imposed upon They have adopted this course from a sense of the great dif-

Benlty, if not impracticability of submitting to the people, for the ir ratification, in senarate articles, the various amendments which have been adopted by majorities of the convention. This difficulty is very much increased, by the reflection, that the adoption some articles, and the rejection of others, might greatly impair the symmetry of the whole. The convenience of having the amendments incorporated with those parts of the constitution which are to remain unaftered, will readily be perceived. We therefore, submit to the people, the choice between the old, and amended constitu tion.

THAT difference of opinion should exist among individuals, on the various topics which have passed in review before us, will not excite sur-prise. Various local interests, and diversity of political sentiment, among a free people, will of necessity, lead to different opinions. Probably, the amended constitution, now submitted, is not, in all its provisions, in exact accordance with the desires of any individual member of the convention : but in the spirit of mutual concession and compromise, we have come to a result, which we hop: the people, actuated by the same spirit, will ap-prove and ratify. We therefore, submit it to your investigation, reflection, and final decision, with the most respeetful deference; & do most devoutly implore the supreme ruler of the universe, that he will perpetuate the blessings of rational liberty, and endue us plenteously with that wisdam from above, which is profitable to direet in all things.
