


A CONVERSATION WITH AUTHOR JIM DEFELICE

The "Acting for a Change" program will begin in June and July with a series of drama group sessions that will explore a range of themes through improvisation and culminate with a community performance. The Library is hosting a reception on **Thursday, June 4th** to introduce Ron and Linda. 



The library is a positive influence to our youth with its inviting displays, award winning literature and interesting programs that range from preschool years through high school. Adults are seen enjoying a game of mahjong or scrabble, working on a puzzle or participating in book discussions. Our library has become more than just a building; it's a place to meet friends with common interests and learn about ourselves, our community, and our world.

The Albert Wisner Public Library is my favorite place in Warwick. I believe that our library offers services and opportunities to the public not found elsewhere: unique and experiential programs, and creative and exciting ways of serving the community. In balancing the traditional and digital needs of our changing world I love the willingness and enthusiasm of our organization and its employees to provide materials and rise to meet the demands of the community. I have been proud to be part of the dedicated group of professionals and individuals on the Board of Trustees who share my passion for the library system. I will continue to commit myself to the mission of the library and the residents of our town.



The proposed FY 2015-2016 budget reflects the Library Board's continued commitment to maintain support for our library and its popular programs and services, while managing cost increases for our community. Consistent and growing support from the Friends of the Library and the AWPL Foundation allow us to provide many of the programs and additional library materials that would not be possible with public support alone.

For FY 2014-2015 the Library Board proposes to increase the library tax rate from \$3.23 to \$3.48/\$1,000 of assessed value for Warwick property owners, and from \$0.74 to \$0.79/\$1,000 for Chester property owners in our Library district. While rates are estimated, the average increase would be \$10 to \$14.00 a year.

A public hearing on the proposed Library tax levy is scheduled for Tuesday, March 24th at 7pm in the Community Room at the Library.
