American Lives: Frank Lloyd Wright the story of the greatest of all American architects. Wright was an authentic American genius. Over the course of his long career, he designed more than 800 buildings, including such revolutionary structures as the Guggenheim Museum, the Johnson Wax Building, Fallingwater, Unity Temple and Taliesin. (K)

The Civil War is an epic comprehensive and definitive history of the American Civil War, and the recipient of 40 major film and television awards, including two Emmys and two Grammys. (H and K)

Empire of the Air: The Men Who Made Radio examines the lives of three extraordinary men - Lee de Forest, Edwin Howard Armstrong and David Sarnoff - who shared the primary responsibility for this invention and its early success, and whose genius, friendship, rivalry and enmity interacted in tragic ways. (H and K)

Jazz: The History of Jazz Music in America a celebration of America's greatest original art form. Opens at the dawn of the 20th century, incorporating American culture and historical events that interact directly with the music. ***Jazz*** paints an astounding portrait of a nation and its improvisational core of music. (H and K)

Mark Twain In his time, Mark Twain was considered the funniest man on earth. Yet he was also an unflinching critic of human nature, using his humor to attack hypocrisy, greed and racism; an illuminating portrait of the man who is also one of the greatest writers in American history. (H and K)

The National Parks tells the story of an idea as uniquely American as the Declaration of Independence and just as radical: that the most special places in the nation should be preserved, not for royalty or the rich, but for everyone. The series explores the stories of people who were willing to devote themselves to saving some precious portion of the land they loved. (H and K)

Prohibition tells the story of the rise, rule, and fall of the Eighteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution and the entire era it encompassed. The culmination of nearly a century of activism, Prohibition was intended to improve, even to ennoble, the lives of all Americans, to protect individuals, families, and society at large from the devastating effects. The Roosevelts: An Intimate History chronicles the lives of Theodore, Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt, three members of the most prominent and influential family in American politics. It is the first time in a major documentary television series that their individual stories have been interwoven into a single narrative. (H and K)

Thomas Jefferson one of the most fascinating and complicated figures ever to walk across America's public stage - our enigmatic and brilliant third president. A true renaissance man - a scholar, a philosopher, a diplomat, an aesthete, and an architect, Jefferson's influence on and vision for our country reverberates to this day. (H and K)
